Another generation discovers Wills

When he and the rest of the Round Up Boys opened the show at the recent Bob Wills Birthday Bash, singer-guitarist Bob Fjeldsted noticed something he hadn't noticed before at western-swing dances.

"There were really a lot of young people there," he says. So many, in fact, that the monthly dances the Round Up Boys have been playing at the Cain's Ballroom are now officially welcoming all ages.

"For the three years we've been doing the dances, they've been advertised as for 55 (years of age) and over, although we don't check IDs," he said with a chuckle. "So maybe we shouldn't say that. We want to invite everybody, to help western swing stay alive."

"You know, we're not first-generation western swing. We're second generation. We want to help make sure there's a third generation, so when Bob Wills' 150th birthday comes along, they'll be celebrating it at the Cain's like we did."

To help point up the new approach, young acts will play before each of the Round Up Boys' three sets this Sunday. Jake Duncan and Shaw Montgomery are set to open the first set, the **Pendleton Sisters** the second, and Eric Dysert the third. All, says Fjeldsted, are between 11 and 20 years old.

"They're all members of the Oklahoma Fiddlers' Association," he adds. "Now, they're getting to ply their trade in the western-swing genre."

The dance runs from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday at the Cain's, 423 N. Main St. Admission is \$8 at the door.
